My Coronavirus Christmas

It has always been the privilege of the chair to give the introductions at our main meetings, tell stories, amusing anecdotes As a captive audience there has been no escape, the advantage of the Newsletter is you can skip the bits you are not interested in, so those of you who do not want to share my own Christmas anecdote and musing please skip this introduction and move to the U3A news.

I am sharing this as a record of just one U3A member’s experience of the festive season.

Told we could have up to three households for Christmas we were planning for my son and one daughter to come with their respective families which included children aged 4,5,7,8 and 12. Starved of their company since March the house was turned into something resembling Santa’s Grotto it took me a week, trees, tinsel, greenery, every bubble for three generations. Turkey etc ordered, cupboards stocked, far too many presents wrapped and strategically placed.

On the Saturday the news was delivered, one household for one Christmas day, too far to travel, too disruptive for young children, no Christmas with family.

Then on the Sunday we received news that my brother in law who was taken into hospital with a broken hip had contracted the Virus and passed away. No time now for anything other than organising his funeral, which with the help of a wonderful funeral director and church was held on Christmas Eve eve in Cheshire. It was a truly lovely service and we were touched by the members of the Church congregation who took time to attend. The funeral director had to leave quite quickly as he had five funerals that day, still two more to go. How many families and individuals must be in our position?

Our two children attended the funeral and after the interment (no wake, no get together with the other mourners) we moved to a local supermarket car park where in the gathering gloom of a rainstorm, presents and food parcels were given out and exchanged into car boots.

In sharing what we would miss most, I included singing in carol services. Coming from the generation that started each school day with a hymn and for a while being a teacher, I really miss the carol services, school, church and community singing. Aaarrrrhh said my children, we can do something about that! Christmas Eve (next day) we would Zoom altogether with my daughter and her family in the USA and have a family carol concert with instruments including Tuba, Cornet and Piano. It later transpired that the 8 year old and 4 year old who had asked for and were to receive a keyboard and junior guitar were rather "miffed" that the concert was not to be held on boxing day so they could also play their new instruments!

So the "cheer up" family Zoom carol concert was arranged, words arrived, music set up ready to go. The family in USA were also on line and we were off. I can now hear the laughter from those of you who have tried to hold your singing groups and instrumental groups over Zoom. Now factor in a delay from USA. It was a disaster! This concert will go down in family history as the "Abstract" carol concert and the laughter at the time will echo down the years in the retelling.

Humour and laughter can be found in the strangest places and times and is to be treasured, probably even more in times of grief, loss and disappointment. Sympathy and empathy have their place but for me smiles and laughter is the tonic which helps most.
