

Chance meetings can sometimes bring totally expected outcomes. While out walking with my dog over Shaky Bridge at Cefnllys, I meet a couple who turned out to be the producer and researcher for Weatherman Walking, who were considering the area for a programme to be filmed in the following two weeks. The conversation naturally turned on the history, of Saint Michael's Church and Cefnllys Castle, then on to the natural beauty of our surroundings. Never one to miss an opportunity I suggested it would be an ideal venue for our u3a art group. The Art Group meets once a month at Celf o Gwmpas in a studio environment with all facilities to hand. The intrepid members of the group also have the opportunity to work outside "en plein air" at different venues during the summer months. The researchers took my details and rang the next day. Result.

I contacted our local u3a historians Julian Ravest and Julian Lovell for their help. Then the art group members, who have shown interest in working outside, nine artists Judith, Susie, Helen, Dave, John, Roger, David, Kathryn and I meet at Shaky Bridge at 11.00 on the 18th October the morning of filming. Starting our different sketches, at first by the bridge looking over to the church, then asked to move into the Church yard for filming.



I was touched and totally surprised that Patricia Munroe's memorial stone had been newly placed in the church yard by where we were working, appropriate as Patricia had been instrumental in setting up the u3a art group in the first place. Derek Brockway and the small crew were charming and interviewed us all in turn. It got a bit cold and there were a few spots of rain – but overall the experience was most enjoyable. I am sure they will edit down to a few minutes but hopefully the "plug" for our u3a will remain in.

Garden Visiting Group.

Our September Garden Visit, the last one for 2023, took place at the end of the month with the weather being very kind to us once again. We set of from Llandrindod in the middle of the morning to head off for our lunch venue at The White Lion Inn, Leominster, revisiting there following on from our July visit where we once again had an enjoyable lunch before travelling on to our designated garden being Old Court Nurseries and The Picton Garden on the edge of the village of Colwall situated on the lower slopes of the Malvern Hills.

On arriving at the Garden in lovely sunshine we were warmly welcomed by Helen, a third generation of the Picton family, who gave us an introductory talk on the history of the garden and how it has evolved and developed over the years since being established in 1906. Helen, with her husband, Ross Barbour, are now the curators for the Plant Heritage National Collection of autumn flowering asters and related species.



We were then invited to stroll through the gardens at our leisure and we were able to view the wonderful colourful collection of Michaelmas daisies which did not disappoint in addition to the other plants that we were able to see on walking the winding paths that took us around the garden which is full of unusual plants and trees with something different around every corner.



After spending a very pleasant time exploring and trying to recognise the many interesting plants and finally the purchasing of plants, it was time to leave for our next venue, The Colwall Park Hotel just a short distance from the garden, where we enjoyed tea/coffee and cakes before returning through lovely countryside with the sun still shining and thoughts for other gardens to be visited next year.

Steven was born in Cardiff and brought up in Bristol. After a brief spell working on the trawlers, he travelled overland to India in the mid-Seventies. On his return to Britain, he moved to Llandrindod Wells, where he lived for the rest of his life. He was a keen cyclist in his youth, he even built his own racing bike.

Later, Steven was obliged to adopt a more sedentary lifestyle as a result of an inherited progressive muscle-wasting disease, which increasingly impaired his mobility. He then devoted his time to his other love, photography.


Steven loved abstract photography and looked for patterns in everyday object, which he was able to continue his flat and balcony.
